New Discovery


It is always good to discover a completely unrecorded view and we are grateful to Richard Halliday for the image of this Pineapple Border series diamond-shaped pickle dish. At first we thought it must be a clip from one of the larger views in the series but it turns out to be a previously unrecorded view of Denbigh Castle. The source (illustrated below courtesy of Gordon Bell) is a lithograph by Francis Nicholson, found on a sheet showing four views of castles in Wales. Interestingly, one of the others depicted is titled Dolbadern, and could be the source for the "Dalberton Tower" view in the same series.





The Transferware Recorder, Volume Four


Those of you who have not yet acquired Volume Four of *The Transferware Recorder* may not know what you are missing. Newly discovered is this coffee pot in the William Alsager Adderley "Anglais" series (Volume Two of The Transferware Recorder) which appeared recently on eBay. It has the views of "Balmoral Castle" (illustrated) and "Abbotsford" (with "Ellen's Isle") on the two sides and the small scene of a Stag with Dogs on the cover. Listed as a teapot, we feel it is probably a coffee pot, but we can't be certain without knowing if there is a strainer inside. In any event, a new item to add to those recorded in this attractive aesthetic series. It does, of course, beg the question - does anyone know of any matching cups?


New Discovery


In assembling the chapter on Riley's Large Scroll Border series for Volume One of The Transferware Recorder it was not possible to locate an image of the view of "Bickley, Kent". It was known on a ten-sided sauce tureen (an example is in the collection at Sturbridge Village) and reported on a small dished plate. We have still not been able to confirm the latter but we do now have images of the sauce tureen and its cover (courtesy Sue Norman). The tureen bears a clear title mark with the potter's name Riley but the cover has an unrecorded view. This example is not titled but we can reveal that it shows Gaunt House in Dorset. The source print taken, as usual, from John Preston Neale's Views of the Seats, is shown here. A great find!






It was offered by Tring Market Auctions last month, but failed to sell against a realistic estimate of £160 to £200. The saving grace for us is that we now have a good image of the view, showing Warwick Castle, to add to the relatively poor image of the same view in the Careys' version of the series, illustrated on a soup tureen cover in Volume One of The Transferware Recorder.
