Slowly but surely we are managing to tick off missing images from the earlier volumes of *The Transferware Recorder* and here's another one. "The Ages of Man" series made in Swansea by Dillwyn and their successors Evans & Glasson is hard to find, and we failed to locate an example of The Lover to illustrate and even its existence was in question. Well, here it is now, on a small plate with a gadrooned rim, printed in black and with a nice Dillwyn impressed mark (shown courtesy of Lorna Batchelor). For reasons mentioned in TR4, Doctor Syntax has failed to make any appearance in *The Transferware Recorder*, but for those of you missing your fix of the "lovable rogue" we have a couple of children's plates with "The Garden Trio" and "Dr. Syntax Return'd from his Tour" (courtesy of Alan Williams). The moulded animal border is distinctive but the maker is unknown. We have notes of at least six different scenes with some examples printed in black and enamel coloured, so the series would clearly be worth a detailed look at some stage. Can anyone offer any other pieces?





We were delighted recently to unearth this two-handled mug in the "Pickwick" series by John & Robert Godwin (shown courtesy of Chris Fox). At a stroke it has provided two of the three images missing from Volume Four of *The Transferware Recorder* and has also confirmed both titles. It shows "Mr. Winkle Appears Before Mr. Pickwick" and "The Valentine". It is also an unrecorded item for both scenes. Can anyone now produce an image of "Mr. Pickwick in the Card Room at Bath"?



Mark Time



The Ridgway Angus Seats series in TR2 included mention of a drainer with an impressed mark, the name Sharp or Sharpe, with no further details. We now have another similarly marked drainer (images courtesy Richard Collier) and the mark is frustratingly not clear. It certainly seems to read "SHARPS" although the first and last letters, both probably "S", are not crisply impressed. Not a great deal of help. It remains, along with "OLD OCTAGON" found on other Ridgway drainers, a conundrum. Any theories would be welcome.



Pickle Dishes

Pickle dishes have always been popular with collectors and they feature in many of the series covered in The Transferware Recorder. The two examples shown here are previously unrecorded, one with a view of The Rookery in Surrey from Ralph Stevenson's Acorn and Oak Leaf Border series (courtesy of Len Kling), the other with a vignette from "The Coronation of George IV" from Jones & Sons' uncommon "British History" series (courtesy Mel Blachford). The lattter is one of a pair, one with a previously unseen impressed mark of "WARRANTED" curving beneath a crown. Both series are covered in detail in Volume One of The Transferware Recorder. Anyone interested in pickle dishes might like to read Richard Halliday's excellent 200-page

booklet "Blue-Pickle Printed Dishes & Milseys", available on free download from the TCC website.
