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Auction Report and Unrecorded View

This ornate soup tureen from the “Metropolitan Scenery” series is not unrecorded, notable for having Windsor Castle and a cricket match scene on either side (also



known on platters, drainers, and a shop display jug). We have seen two examples of the tureen before, one shown in TR3 with a “View of Sion House” on the cover. This latest example appeared for sale in Knights Sporting Auctions and sold for a total of £11,780. An expensive buy for a cricket enthusiast! That is remarkable in itself, but a

nice touch is that the cover on this one had a new, previously unrecorded view, the source print now identified as “Windsor, from the Island” (shown above). Fascinating for us, and a bonus for the collector. The auctioneers can be reached through their website:

New Items

It is always good to find an unusual item to add to our lists so here's a pierced basket in the Herculaneum Cherub Medallion Border series (covered in detail in TR1). This appeared just recently in a small mixed lot sold by the Wotton Auction Rooms. It was nicely marked with the title cartouche “WORCESTER” and a clear impressed maker's mark. By coincidence, we also have another new item, a circular stand from the same series (shown courtesy of Terry Neale



Sheppard). Again with a clearly impressed maker's mark, although this time with no title but the unusual printed “STONE CHINA” ribbon mark. Normally a pierced basket would have a pierced stand, but in view of the fact that none of the tureens in the series are circular, we just wonder whether these two pieces might be a match? 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Auction Report A Greek Revival?

We don't often feature sales on eBay here since results are so erratic, but we did note the sale of this attractive Spode Greek series comport last month (image courtesy Paul Mooney). It fetched £1,020 which

is an exceptional price by any measure (no further premium on eBay). By a strange quirk of fate a magnificent footbath (and we don't tend to use superlatives very often), also from Spode's Greek series, sold on the very next day at Hannams Auctioneers for a massive hammer price of £4,000 (against an estimate of just \$40-60!). That is a total of £5,104 when

Colourful and Unusual

This platter was recently brought to our attention, largely because of the clear impressed mark "W.S. & Co's / WEDGE-WOOD". There isn't any similar pattern on the www.reynardine.co.uk website page for William Smith & Co., nor is there anything to compare in John Griffin's brilliant book on *The Yorkshire Potteries*. The treatment with the pink ground and green foliate scroll border is unusual in itself, but the printed central design is strikingly different. Has anyone seen any comparable piece? The platter is quite large, around 40cm long, so must be classed with dinner wares (shown courtesy of Kristin Bailey).




Kepple of Bristol
